Look What You Did!

The eighth annual Peace Dale Congregational Church Pumpkin Patch finished another successful pumpkin season. Every pumpkin was taken by the day before Halloween. In the process of distributing approximately 5000 pumpkins for decorations and enjoyment, we also generated a lot of goodwill for Peace Dale Congregational Church and the Welcome House.

We raised approximately \$32,000 of which Welcome House will receive 40% plus all the daily donations received; we also pay the Navajo farmers for their pumpkins out of what we raised. Our success is due to the generosity and support of Peace Dale Congregational Church, our congregants, and, of course, our strategically-located front lawn. Additionally, we were fortunate to again have the support of Sodco, which provided all of the Pumpkin pallets; Emmett Johnson, who delivered and unloaded the pallets, as well as unloaded the pumpkins and gourds from the trailer; and over 72 community members who unloaded our trailer full of pumpkins.

We are especially appreciative for the PDCC members, Boy Scouts, members of the South Kingstown High School football team, members of the South Kingstown High School National Honor Society, and the five members of the South Kingstown police Department – including our Police Chief – all of whom joined in to unload the pumpkins. It was amazing to witness our community coming together for this mission to help Welcome House.

Thanks also to Steve Stabile for providing and putting up our carport/weather-shelter, Byron Fish and Brad Alton for providing the decorative plywood cut outs for family picture taking, and especially all of the students who worked every afternoon and weekend manning our Patch.

Finally, know that our success is due to the support and help of our apron-wearing church and Pastor Fred. Our PDCC reputation and respect in this community were continually lauded during our Pumpkin Season, which made all the time and efforts so worth it.

We Are Facing a Deficit for 2023 – We Can Do Our Part to Prevent It

This is a call for each of us to help minimize or eliminate the budget deficit that is looming for the current year. In February, the congregation passed a "faith budget" for 2023 that identified a potential built-in deficit of about \$10,000 – but also built-in hope that contributions would increase to cover that. Budgeting is always a difficult projection of possibilities. The faith part of our budget is that contribution expectations will not only be met but possibly be exceeded. However, this is not turning out to be the case. The amount of contributions budgeted is \$277,000. Contributions represent 67% of our total budget. The other income sources are dependable and static.

What is happening on the contribution side?

Our total contribution receipts as of September 30 are \$195,310 (which is 71% of the total \$277,000 contributions budgeted). This is **\$15,480 less** than at the same time last year, when we also had the same total amount of contributions budgeted.

From another perspective, there are 76 faith commitment (formally pledging) units for a total of \$203,000. To date we have received \$151,000 from those who pledged, or 74%. It is felt (hoped) that those who made this faith commitment will complete that. If not, then we will have a shortfall in that area.

There is a significant number of us who attend and are members who do not make a faith commitment. This leads to uncertainty. The church has received \$44,000 from this group out of a budgeted need for \$74,000, or only 60% received.

If none of this is met, we are facing a deficit of at least \$25,000 for 2023.

Bottom line, what you can do:

1. If you have made a faith commitment, please fulfill that as soon as possible. Also please consider increasing your commitment for 2024.

- 2. If you do not make such a commitment but are a contributing member or an involved non-member, please contribute at least what you did last year. Also please consider making a faith commitment for 2024.
- 3. To our new members, we are thankful you are part of us and thankful for what you can give of time, talents, and treasure. Please consider making a faith commitment for 2024.
- 4. To all participants in the church, please consider using RaiseRight cards for all of your shopping. You receive the full value of the gift card and the church receives of percentage of sales. The budgeted amount from this receipt item is \$5,000, and presently we are well below that. In the past, this area has been able to bring in \$15,000 to the church.

What about expenses?

There is no cushion in the church expenses. Almost 100% of our expenses are to maintain our current operation – program and building. Mission giving is a non-budget item. That means to meet a current deficit we will possibly have to turn to the endowment, from which we already receive 6%. The budgeting for 2024 will undoubtedly mean eliminating some activities or counting on even a greater degree of volunteer work for core functions. We are already stretched in this area.

So please give this serious, prayerful consideration and please do your part. Please contact Jim Blackerby, Carol Vetter, or Peter Swain if you have questions.

Green Life: Leave the Leaves!

Who doesn't stop in their tracks and find themselves in awe at least once in autumn at the brilliantly colored leaves. Most of us, I imagine.

But wait! They fall and the joy turns to angst. What to do with them?!

The usual response is to rake or blow them and get them as far away as possible. However, that action is no longer deemed to be a best practice within the growing green movement.

Not well known is the fact that the leaves that fall represent about 80 percent of the food the tree produced through photosynthesis during its growing season. And that "food" is intended to stay in place to feed the roots of the tree in order for the process of renewal to recur the next growing

the tree's "**food in the pantry**" which it draws from as the leaves break down over the winter.

As the leaves continue to fall, consider the benefits for the shrubs and trees if you **left their leaves** beneath. Not only do they replenish the soil and tree roots, but equally important, they provide food, habitat and shelter throughout the winter to varying stages of insects—spiders, bees, beetles and butterflies—as well as a source of protein for birds.

There is an abundance of information online through Xerces Society, if you Google "leave the leaves", or if you are on Instagram, #leavetheleaves.

Please consider this kind adaptation to your own gardening. Also take a moment throughout the year to observe **PDCC's own three pollinator gardens** on the perimeter of the parking area which provide shelter and habitat. For the last two years, and continuing this year, we will "leave the leaves".

November Mission of the Month: Domestic Violence Resource Center



The Domestic Violence Resource Center of South County (DVRCSC) is a Trauma-Informed

Agency whose main focus is to help victims of domestic violence break the cycle of abuse in their lives. Each department – Advocacy, Case Management, and Counseling – provides resources, guidance, and support to help victims get to safety, become independent, and heal.

The DVRC is working to change social norms that contribute to the continuance of violence. The goal is to help a victim break the cycle of violence, to heal in order, and have healthy relationships in the future.

The DVRC provides a comprehensive range of services for victims of domestic violence and their children, including:

- 24/7 Helpline
- Drop-In Center
- Safe Home, Transitional Housing, and Permanent Supportive Housing units
- Support Groups for women, men, teens, friends and family
- One-on-One Counseling
- Court Advocacy

All services at the DVRC of South County are free, confidential, and always handled by trained professionals.


